

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

REPORT OF
SUPERINTENDENT AND SUPERINTENDING
SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your school board submits the following report :

We have been able to keep the schools open twenty-nine weeks this year, and yet keep an unexpended balance in the treasury. While no good precedent of the past has been disregarded, we have tried to make some advance, and believe that we have in some measure succeeded. We have had an able and devoted corps of teachers, who have almost universally won the confidence of parents and pupils. Good progress in learning has been the rule. As last year, there have been no schools in Districts 3, 7, 8 and 16. No other changes have been made. Brief mention may be made of each district, as follows :

No 1. The Old Corner school has been unfortunate this year. Sickness delayed the opening of the school both in the spring and in the fall, and again cut off the winter term, so three weeks should be added to one term next year, to make up time lost this year. Miss Eva C. Thyng taught the spring term and was reappointed for the fall term, but resigned. Miss Margie P. Roberts was appointed in her place and taught the fall term. She also began the winter term, but resigned after one week of school, greatly to the disappointment of parents and pupils, whose goodwill she had won to an unusual degree, in order to accept a better position elsewhere. Miss Marcia Atkinson was appointed to fill the vacancy. All hindrances considered, the school made a good showing during the year, and each teacher is to be commended for her good work.

No. 4. Miss Rose M. Emery has taught this school during the entire year. Pupils and teacher have worked together harmoniously, and the result has been excellent progress. Three of the pupils, Everett L., Arthur M., and Walter A. Woodward, have been present every day throughout the year.

No. 5. This school has again had the services of Mrs. Gertrude Sherburne. The teacher worked hard and faithfully, aiming to interest her pupils in their work, and to impress principles, rather than the words of the book, on the minds of her pupils. The year's results are good. Sickness in the spring closed the school. Four and a half weeks' schooling is due the district.

No. 6. Miss Ella H. Smith has been with the school all of the year. Both teacher and pupils miss the interest inspired by numbers, yet the year's work has been commendable, and good progress has been made. The attendance was excellent. Leon Thompson and Marion Walker did not miss a half day, while none of the others missed more than one or two days.

No. 9. Miss Annabelle Rand taught this school. She is a well fitted teacher, full of enthusiasm for her work. She has succeeded in arousing the interest of parents and winning the love of her pupils, so that the school has made unusual progress. Both teacher and pupils are to be commended for the high grade of work done. The people of the district are justly proud of the school. Edith Abbott, Leslie and Alice Roberts have not missed a half day.

No. 10. Miss L. Alice Bean has had charge of the upper grade here, and Miss Etta A. Holmes of the lower. Both teachers have kept up the good record of last year, and the pupils have made good progress. This is especially noticeable in some cases. Leroy Roberts was not absent a half day.

No. 12. Miss Maud B. Smith has again taught this school. Save during the winter term the attendance has been excellent. Sickness and other causes interfered with the work of this term. Good work has been done by teacher and pupils.

No. 14. Miss Julia I. Bean taught this school during the spring and winter terms, and Miss Eva C. Thyng during the fall term.

Both teachers did excellent work, giving entire satisfaction. The pupils have worked with their teachers and have made splendid progress.

No. 15. Miss Marcia Atkinson taught this school in the spring and fall, pleasing the school board with her work. Miss Myrtle Johnson taught the winter term. Sickness of both teacher and pupils has interfered with the work of the winter term. More active interest in the real progress of the pupils should be shown by the parents in this district, and a better understanding concerning the school would exist if they visited it to see its actual working.

Only minor repairs have been made on the schoolhouses, although all have been furnished with curtains, and some have been cleaned. It was our intention to paint two buildings, and the materials were ordered, but we were unable to get the work done. A generous appropriation is needed this coming year. At least one schoolhouse, the one at East Waterboro, should be furnished with modern desks. We are sorry to say that we have followed the custom and are again in debt for books, yet no books have been bought that were not absolutely necessary. We wish to thank all friends of the schools for their hearty co-operation with us in our work. Where there has been any difference in opinion between us and others, we have in all cases followed our best judgment. For our mistakes we ask charity.

HIGH SCHOOL.

At the close of the spring term, Mr. Linscott resigned his position as principal, to accept a better situation. The pupils and all friends of the school were very sorry to part with him. Mr. Linscott is an able instructor, and by his interest and energy did very much for the school.

Mr. Chas. L. Clement, a graduate of Colby, was engaged and began his work in the fall. Often on changing teachers a serious break in the work occurs until the school adjusts itself to new conditions. No such trouble was experienced this year, but on the contrary the school has steadily advanced under its new leadership.

A class of seventeen entered in the fall, bringing the attendance up to thirty-eight. Very creditable progress has been made. The senior class, which will complete its course in the spring, compares favorably with any class of its grade in the state.

Careful attention has been paid to composition and elocution. The pupils have been taught to express their thoughts clearly on paper, and to speak with self possession before the people. In a joint debate with Phillips-Limerick Academy, our school won with great credit.

Mr. H. B. Leavitt of Medford, Mass., has presented the school with 100 books for the school library. Mrs. Sargent of Haverhill, Mass., has also given 12 volumes. Such interest manifested by friends from abroad should elicit hearty support from us at home. The school has purchased 13 volumes, making 125 volumes in all this year. They have also purchased a teacher's desk, a wall clock, dumb-bells and indian clubs. This shows the willingness of the pupils to help themselves.

The year has been a good one for the school, and principal and pupils deserve commendation. We invite more frequent visits from the citizens, and thank all who have aided the work this year.

An assistant teacher is very much needed, to bring about the best results. The school has been open thirty-four weeks. That all may know the facts, we will state that when all bills to date are paid, there will still be a balance of about \$ 5.00 due the school from the town treasury. This takes account of last year's deficit. Any one can verify this by reference to the town reports since the school opened.

As last year, one member of the board has been absent all of the year, and therefore did not sign this report.
